THE BASICS OF THE WOODLANDS TRAIL PROGRAM

The Woodlands Trail is the first part of an exciting journey for a boy in Trail Life USA.

It leads through the Woodlands with Steps, activities, and new skills that will prepare him for when he advances as a Navigator and, later on, an Adventurer. Eventually, the same trail he is on as a Woodlands Trail Trailman can take him to the peaks of a Freedom Rangeman—the highest achievement on the Trail Life trail.

It is helpful to understand where the Woodlands Trail program fits in the overall Trail Life USA program. The chart on the following page helps illustrate the structure and vision of the program.

WHAT ARE THE BASIC REQUIREMENTS FOR MEMBERSHIP IN TRAIL LIFE USA?

Membership in the program has both youth and adult elements. Youth membership in the program is open to all who meet the membership requirements, and is currently designed for biologically male children under the age of I8. The adult applicant must be at least 18 years of age and subscribe to and abide by the Trail Life USA Statements of Christian Faith and Values as well as the Oath and Motto of the program. While the program is undergirded by Biblical values and unapologetically reflects a Christian worldview, there is also a clearly defined inclusion policy for youth. Accordingly, all boys are welcome irrespective of religion, race, national origin or socio-economic status. integrity in its adult leaders. Charter partners (usually churches) own and operate local Troops, selecting leaders and admitting members as they deem beneficial to their Troop and within the parameters of the organizational policy. The basis for the program's ethical and moral standards is found in the Bible.

WHAT ARE THE SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR YOUTH MEMBERSHIP IN WOODLANDS TRAIL?

The program is designed that:



Foxes start at **5 or 6**. A Trailman must be at least 5 years old to join a Fox patrol.



Hawks start at 7 or 8.



▶ Mountain Lions start at 9 or IO.

Trailmen are expected to advance with other boys their age. Exceptions to the policy are allowed with a one-year variance, beginning with the Hawk patrol, in either direction (advancing or holding back) at the discretion of the Troop Committee. The Trail Life program is not based on academic benchmarks or maturity but on building relationships, spiritual growth, practical skill development, empathy and service, teamwork, and leadership. Boys develop in each of these areas at different rates. Some are natural leaders but need to develop teamwork. Some have mastered outdoor skills but need guidance on interpersonal skills. Regardless, advancing with boys their own age works best in Trail Life USA.

how does the program work?

LEARNING IN THE WOODLANDS TRAIL PROGRAM

The Woodlands Trail curriculum is a 2-year course of study for Trailmen (boys) in each of the three age groups, called "patrols."



(5-6 years old)



Hawks (7-8 years old)



Mountain Lions (9-10 years old)

Within the patrols, larger Troops may have several smaller patrols that are frequently named by the Trailmen.

Meeting plans revolve around a set curriculum to engage and teach program participants using six Program Emphases:



Meeting plans incorporate, directly or indirectly, the "Six F's":

FUN: This portion allows a time where Trailmen can burn off some energy. This is the time of the meeting for the Trailmen to play games or participate in a physical activity.

FOCUS: The Focus portion of the patrol meeting is to provide an academic or instructional element. This is the emphasis of the patrol time together to lay a foundation that the other F's will build upon.

FINGERS: This portion offers an opportunity for the Trailmen to experience a project with "hands-on" learning based on the Focus teaching segment. It is understood that boys learn to apply a lesson better when they can see and build or make something that would remind them of what is being taught.

FAITH: This portion of the meeting communicates pertinent biblical truths, values, and wisdom corresponding to the activity.

FAMILY: The Family portion of the meeting is simply the family emphasis for the principle taught. As the Trailmen learn throughout the years, it is the desire of Trail Life USA to inform and involve the family in the learning process as much as possible.

FOREST AWARD: Identifies the Branches taught and Steps focused on during a meeting for each age group.

'HIT THE TRAIL!' MEETING

While most of the meetings are indoors with a strongly-encouraged outdoors play option, Troops also conduct a monthly 'Hit the Trail!' meeting that includes an off-site activity, event, field trip, or community project.

WOODLANDS TRAIL AWARDS OVERVIEW

Awards can be earned at all patrol levels along the Woodlands Trail. Award criteria are designed to be age-appropriate for the boy's cognitive and physical levels of development.

The primary areas of study in Woodlands Trail are the seven "Branches" (detailed on the following pages).

The Trail Guide presides over the patrol meeting and selects one Branch to work on at a time during the meetings. Each month, the learning portion of three weekly patrol meetings should center on the Branch Steps, with the fourth week being the 'Hit the Trail!' Activity.



THE AWARDS


When a boy joins any of the three Woodlands Trail program age patrols, he may earn the Fox, Hawk, or Mountain Lion "Branch Patch." This joining patch will be worn on the right pocket of the uniform and shows that the boy knows the basics of Trail Life USA, which include the oath, motto, salute, sign, and handshake. It is here he will attach Branch Pins as he progresses.





The Branch Pins correspond to the seven primary instructional areas of the Trail Life USA program for all ages. Branches in the Navigators and Adventurer programs are called "Frontiers." Branch Pins are earned by completing Steps. A Branch Pin will be given for each Branch completed the first program year.

The color of the Branch Pin earned corresponds to the age group so that there is differentiation between Branches earned as a Fox (bronze), a Hawk (silver), and a Mountain Lion (gold).





Here is a helpful description of each Branch. The color indicates the color on the Branch Patch where a Trailman will attach his earned Branch Pin:



Heritage Branch (brown): An exploration of American Heritage, Christian Heritage, and a boy's own family heritage. Emphasis is placed on upholding the finest traditions of the heritage we obtain from our forefathers.

Life Skills Branch (burgundy): Teaching life lessons ranging from practical to higher-level interpersonal skill sets.





Science and Technology Branch (yellow): An exploration of physical and natural science concerning our created world.

Hobbies Branch (black): An exploration of various indoor and outdoor hobbies that demand varying levels of knowledge, skill, or aptitude.





Values Branch (red): Instilling Bible-based values within the boys regarding any number of pertinent topics. The central focus of this Branch is teachings of the Christian faith.

Sports and Fitness Branch (green): Having fun in the outdoors with sports and other activities.





Outdoor Skills Branch (blue): Gaining basic understanding of woodcraft, hiking, exploration, and camping skills.

THE WOODLANDS TRAIL BRANCH PATCH (JOINING AWARD)

A boy begins on the Trail by completing a set of **Joining Award requirements**. On completion, he earns the Branch Patch of his particular patrol (Fox, Hawk, or Mountain Lion), which must be earned before other awards are presented.







Families are encouraged to immediately assist their Trailman in achieving this award by focusing on the following requirements, then allowing the Trailman to demonstrate to the assigned Troop leader that he has mastered them. This is the beginning of a Trailman

accepting and carrying out responsibility in Trail Life USA, a process that will be repeated over and over as he progresses, and the responsibilities increase in the challenge they provide.

Memorize the Trailman Oath.

The Trailman Oath is recited at the beginning of each meeting and at most gatherings. It is the shared commitment to traditional biblical values that binds all Trailmen.

On my honor, I will do my best To serve God and my country; To respect authority; To be a good steward of creation; And to treat others as I want to be treated.

Parents might want to review with their son the meaning behind the Trailman Oath. This will increase the impact of his commitment to live the Trail Life.

- ► Oath An oath is a way of telling everyone how you want to live and what you are going to do.
- "On my honor ..." On my honor means that you really mean what you are about to say and that you promise to do it.
- "... I will do my best ..." When you do your best, it means that you will try as hard as you can until you can't try anymore.
- "... to serve God ..." Serving God means that you obey what God tells you to do. The Bible is where we find what God wants us to do and not to do.
- "... and (to serve) my country; ..." Serving your country means that you obey the laws (rules) like the speed limits and stop signs. It also means that you help others in your community.
- "... to respect authority; ..." Respecting authority means that you listen, obey, and are kind to the people that are in charge, like parents, teachers, policemen, leaders, etc.

- "... to be a good steward of creation; ..." Being a good steward of creation means that you will take care of the world that God made for you like it is a treasure. You do this by not littering, always trying to make things better, and using the things that God gives you wisely (not wasting anything).
- "... and to treat others as I want to be treated." This means that you should think about how you want other people to talk to you and act towards you. Then you should talk to other people the same way and act the same way toward them.

Learn the Trailman Sign and when to use it.



The Trailman sign is made with the right hand held open, palm forward, raising your right arm with your elbow at a right angle.

The sign is used during reciting of the Trailman Oath and is also used by Troop leaders as a signal to be silent.

If you see a Troop leader with his sign up standing quietly you should imitate him and see how fast the room goes silent!

Learn the Trailman Salute and when to use it.



The Trailman Salute is made by raising your right hand. The tip of your fingers should almost touch your right temple or eyebrow. If you wear glasses, the tip of your fingers should almost touch the frames of your glasses. If you are wearing a Trail Life hat, the tip of your fingers should touch the brim.

A proper, crisp salute reflects well on your patrol and Troop. A sloppy salute does not properly honor the great traditions and hard work that went before. Practice bringing your hand up in one, smart motion and holding the salute until you are asked to drop it, then bring your hand directly down to its natural position at your side.

The Trailman Salute is used by Trailmen in uniform (defined by your Troop leaders) when:

- They recite the Pledge of Allegiance
- The flag passes in a parade or ceremony
- You are in a parade and pass the flag
- The flag is raised or lowered on a flagpole
- The national anthem is played or sung
- The flag is retired at flag retirement ceremonies

Learn the Trailman Handshake.



The Trailman Handshake is a forearm to forearm or wrist to wrist handshake.

This handshake was chosen because it is a strong way to assist another person in need.
